Topic	Discussion/Summary	
Introductions & Background	<p>Welcome, Ground Rules and Introductions- Renold conducted round-robin introductions, reviewed the Ground Rules & Shared Agreements, and then moved to agency updates.</p>	
Agency Updates	<p><u>Chris Martin</u> shared that the first Circuit Court jury trials has started, and cases are now moving through the criminal justice system. Chris discussed his role as the lead drug prosecutor has been reshaped to focus more on public health intervention options and treatment options for people charged with drug related offences that are not high-level traffickers. Chris noted that in the coming months his office will introduce a number of policy changes that will reflect moving away from criminally charging low-level drug possessions and drug use cases. Instead, they want to be a resource for individuals and direct them towards community detox support and other treatment programs in addition to Drug Court and Sobriety Court programs already available.</p> <p><u>Da’Neese Wells</u> announced 55th District Court is reevaluating their processes as they reopen to the public. They are seeing more people in person but are also being careful not to return to the previous model of seeing every single person in-person. The hope is to continue remote court proceedings because it offers several benefits such a more court appearances. Da’Neese also mentioned drug court and sobriety court programs have helped many people begin their recovery process due to the possibility of charges being dismissed and removed from permanent criminal history. She also mentioned court staff are trained to use Naloxone in the event of an emergency, and they can give Naloxone kits to court users who ask.</p> <p><u>Tammy Maidlow-Bresnahan</u> shared that due to recent overdose related fatalities on the MSU campus, a couple of fraternities and a pub have reached out to ICHD, asking to receive Naloxone training and kits to help in the event of an overdose. She also mentioned ICHD has created Naloxone On Site posters, so businesses and agencies can inform the public that Naloxone is available in the event of an overdose.
